- seventh in agronomy and crop sciences
- seventh in zoology
- eighth in horticulture
- eighth in agricultural sciences overall
- eighth in American studies
- twentieth in the broad category of health professions science

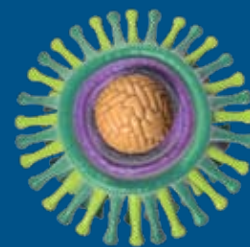
FIRST IN NATION

Elson S. Floyd took office as the 10th president of Washington State University on May 21, 2007. Before coming to WSU, Dr. Floyd served as president of the four-campus University of Missouri system and of Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo. He also held leadership posts at Eastern Washington University and at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Campus Profiles

Washington State University was founded in Pullman in 1890, and Pullman remains the system's largest campus and home to the central administration. In 1989, additional campuses were created in Spokane, the Tri-Cities, and Vancouver to offer upper division, graduate, and professional programs to students in growing but underserved regions of the state. WSU Vancouver began admitting freshmen in fall 2006 and WSU Tri-Cities' first freshman class was in fall 2007.
