National Recognition

Washington State University people and programs are frequently recognized for excellence, as these examples demonstrate:

- WSU is in the top tier of American research universities, among the 96 public and private institutions classified for "very high research activity" by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.
- In 2008, WSU became one of just 175 public and private universities to earn the dual Community Engagement classification, for both curricular engagement and outreach and partnerships, also from the Carnegie Foundation.
- In the Academic Analytics' 2006 Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index, WSU plant scientists were ranked second in the nation, those in veterinary medical sciences were third, those in animal science were fourth, and others were in the top 10.
- WSU programs recently highlighted as among the best in the nation include the Writing Across the Curriculum Program, the International Business Program, the Entrepreneurship Program, and both undergraduate and graduate programs in Interior Design.

Campus Profiles

Washington State University was founded in Pullman in 1890, and Pullman remains the system's largest campus and home to the central administration. In 1989, additional campuses were created in Spokane, the Tri-Cities, and Vancouver to offer upper division, graduate, and professional programs to students in growing but underserved regions of the state. WSU Vancouver began admitting freshmen in fall 2006 and WSU Tri-Cities' first freshman class was in fall 2007.

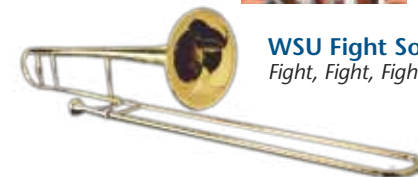
