Productivity and National Recognition

Plant scientists at Washington State University are among the most productive and most impactful in the world, according to 2010 rankings released by Thomson Reuters. In its "Essential Science Indicators," the business and professional information gathering company ranked WSU 13th in the world and 6th in the United States based on the number of journal articles produced by faculty scientists.

The *Daily Beast* ranks WSU 22nd among "technology's most powerful colleges." The rankings look at leaders in the nation's biggest tech companies and most promising startups to identify the schools whose students are "destined for high-tech greatness."

WSU stands among the top 23 best colleges nationwide for its university-wide writing program, according to *U.S. News and World Report* (2011). The 25-year-old program helps students from all majors to develop their writing skills, using a peer tutoring model.

WSU stands among the nation's top 25 colleges and universities that best prepare its students for workforce success, according to a 2010 *Wall Street Journal* survey of corporate recruiters.

Washington State University was founded in Pullman in 1890, and Pullman remains the system's largest campus and home to the central administration. In 1989, additional campuses were created in Spokane, the Tri-Cities, and Vancouver to offer upper division, graduate, and professional programs to students in growing but underserved regions of the state. WSU Vancouver began admitting freshmen in fall 2006 and WSU Tri-Cities' first freshman class was in fall 2007.

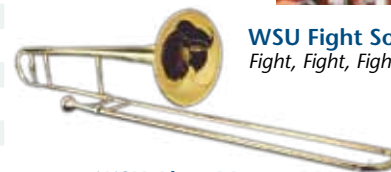
